





Secure the Coiling Gizmo bracket, then push the cranking rod through the holes. Wind the end of a spool of coloured wire twice round the handle to secure (Fig.1), then turn it to create a coil (Fig.2). Once it reaches the required length, snip the wire and slide it off the rod, trimming any excess.

Thread silver wire inside the coil (Fig.3) then secure to the rod handle as before. Make a few coils of silver wire then start feeding the coil onto the cranking rod (Fig.4). When the coloured coil has been wound on, make a few silver coils, then remove from the rod and make loops at each end. Make up six beads of differing sizes and colours in this way.

3 Cover a 4cm rhodium link with purple ribbon, leaving 20cm ends hanging down. Tie on a 44cm length of purple ribbon and two of green ribbon to have eight lengths hanging down. Make a long silver coil, gently pull to 18cm long, then thread silver wire through and loop one end. Wrap the coil round the ring until the two ends meet, make another loop and connect with a 9mm jump ring.









Thread bicones onto silver wire, forming eye pins, then form a chain with these and the colled wire beads using 5mm jump rings. Attach half of a toggle clasp to the 9mm jump ring and connect one side of the necklace also to this ring. Secure



the other part of the toggle clasp with a 5mm jump ring to the other side of the necklace. Thread lengths of coloured coils onto the contrasting ribbons hanging from the hoop, knot the ribbon twice below the coil so the lengths vary slightly and trim on a slant.

# Top tips



Maria Cassidy works at Creative Beadcraft's London store and also runs some of their workshops. Here are her tops tips for using the Coiling Gizmo.

Make sure you hold the wire or coil tube firmly and feed it steadily onto the rod while winding to create

Trim the ends of the wire closely to make neat beads. You can file the cut wire with a needle file for completely smooth ends.

Keep your wire on the reel before winding so there is less wastage than cutting a piece off.

Make a simple pair of earrings by making a coil, threading wire through and forming a loop at each end.
Connect the loops to a jump ring and thread it onto an earwire.

Try attaching two or three wires in contrasting colours to the rod and winding them on to make a varicoloured coil.

Experiment with different tensions to create a variety of effects. Leave a coil on the rod, the length of the bead you wish to make. Take another coil and wind it loosely over the coil on the rod so you can see the coil in the middle. This method makes stunning earrings.

Try experimenting with different thicknesses of wire and combine various diameter coils for a wide range of effects.

Make your own coloured jump rings by simply cutting through a coil.

## TAKE IT further

#### **Coiled Earrings**

Make two 5mm coils of olive wire, threading them with silver wire and forming into coiled beads as for the necklace. Slip a bicone onto a head pin, form a loop and attach to the bottom of each bead, then add an earwire to the top. Coiled Bead and Ribbon Necklace & Earings (Kit 114) £10.95





### **Shaped Coils**

Form a 14cm pink coil, then thread with silver wire and bend into a heart shape, looping the silver wire ends and securing both with a 9mm jump ring. Add a cluster of bicone drops at the top of the pendant. Make up seven beaded coiled beads as for the beaded earrings and link together with 9mm jump rings, attaching the heart pendant. Add chain and a clasp to the ends to finish. Coiled Bead and Heart Necklace & Earings (Kit 115) £7.95

#### **Beaded Earrings**

Make beaded coiled beads by threading 50 small seed beads onto a length of wire before you start winding. Make six plain coils, then start to wind on the wire with the seed beads, making a few more coils without beads to mish. Thread on silver wire, make loops then add a bicone at the bottom and an earwire at the top to complete.
